ST ALBAN, BRITAIN'S FIRST SAINT,

Alban lived in about 300 CE in the Roman town of Verulamium (today's St Albans). One day he gave shelter to a Christian priest - Amphibalus - fleeing persecution. Alban was so moved by the Christian priest's courage and faith that he asked to be taught about Christianity even though at that time it was a forbidden religion. As a result of Amphibalus' witness Alban became a Christian. When the Roman soldiers came to arrest Amphibalus, Alban exchanged cloaks with him so he could escape. Alban was brought before the city magistrates who ordered him to sacrifice to the Roman emperor and gods. Alban refused, boldly declaring, 'I am called Alban and I worship and adore the one true and living God, He who created all things.' Alban was condemned to death, taken out of the town




and beheaded for his faith. Alban's welcome to the persecuted stranger is a powerful example of courage, compassion and hospitality, all characteristics Jesus calls us to have. St Alban's Abbey was built over the site of Alban's execution and his shrine within the abbey is a site of pilgrimage today.

St Alban is one of the saints on the nave screen installed in 2015. (The others are Oscar Romero, St Alban Roe, St Amphibalus, George Tankerfield, Sister Elisabeth Romanova and Dietrich Bonhoeffer, all people murdered for our faith.)

Thank you to Tim for suggesting St Alban as his favourite saint.





Reading about St Alban reminds me that there are still many who are persecuted for their faith and makes the current BMS campaign all the more relevant. The church hosted an *I Will Stand* service for the BMS 2021 Harvest Appeal, where inspirational video stories were shown about Christians living in hard places hostile to the gospel but overcoming the challenges.
