The Christingle Service will be by Zoom. A Christingle kit, consisting of



an orange, candle, ribbon, cocktail sticks and jelly babies, will be available so that children can make their own Christingles at home. (Will the jelly babies make it onto the cocktail sticks?!) However, the service on Christmas Day will take place in the church as this service is not usually so crowded. We must emphasise that all these arrangements will only take place if the government guidelines permit

it. At the time of writing we have no way of knowing what we will be allowed to do.

We will collect donations and food for the Taunton Foodbank. Please check their website to see what they need as it varies from week to week. Last week it was porridge, this week it is hot chocolate and meat pies! Go to https://taunton.foodbank.org.uk/ and follow the links to "donate food".



Why is it important? Without a shared vision we are all heading in different directions with no clear purpose. In any organisation, people

who are not engaged with what they do, with no clear idea of the goal tend to be more dissatisfied and less enthusiastic about what they do. The same applies to churches.

Carl Smethurst preached on Home Mission at our service on Sunday 22^{nd} November. His theme was "The sent and sending God – called to be a missionary community". Are there areas where God has called us to go but we haven't got there yet? "Go!" is a theme repeated throughout scripture. The reasons may not be clear but we may be called to go to new places, new people or new relationships. Challenging ourselves and our mindsets is not easy but as we have been blessed so we are called to go out and be a blessing to the people around us.

lovely day and wishes to thank all who sent greetings .We hope she will still be able to celebrate with her family post-Covid. From Tony and Gill ...


